ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

Jacob Sustaita
Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony
Music Director for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra

Dr. Jacob Sustaita serves as the Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony and Music Director Carl St.Clair, a position he has held since the fall of 2020. Dr. Sustaita also serves as Music Director and Conductor for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra (PSYO), the premier training orchestra of Orange County, recognized as one of the most outstanding youth orchestras in the country.

Dr. Sustaita is the newly appointed Orchestra Director for the Orange County School of the Arts Symphony Orchestra. In the fall of 2021 and 2022, Sustaita served as Acting Director of Orchestras at the Bob Cole Conservatory of Music at California State University Long Beach (CSULB). From 2015–20, he led the Sam Houston State University Symphony, Chamber, Ballet, and Opera Orchestras as Director of Orchestral Studies. In 2016, Sustaita and the Symphony Orchestra performed the American premiere of Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 1(original Linz version) with high praise from the American and European Bruckner Societies.

Dr. Sustaita is a frequent guest conductor and clinician across the country. In 2015, Sustaita was selected by Carnegie Hall's Weill Institute to serve as Assistant Conductor for Charles Dutoit and the National Youth Orchestra of America (NYO). Sustaita regularly conducted and coached the orchestra during its New York residency and on their seven-city tour of China and Hong Kong.

A native of Texas, Sustaita completed his Doctorate and Bachelor of Music degrees at the University of Houston, where he served as Assistant Conductor for the Moores Opera Center for three seasons. He also earned a Master of Music degree from both Penn State University and Rice University.

His honors include: Schissler Conducting Fellowship, Rice University Prize and Provost Fellowship, and American Prize semi-finalist and finalist. His teachers and mentors include Carl St.Clair, Charles Dutoit, Franz Krager, Brett Mitchell, Gerardo Edelstein, and Paavo Järvi.

Hansen specializes in fusing world rhythms with unique percussion instrumentations, unique electronic instrumentation, and neo-classical Latin inspired guitar but he also explores other art forms including drawing, painting, sculpting, audio/video production, animation, and live event production among other interests.

is a Los Angelesbased composer, audio engineer, and keyboardist. He is a pioneer of performance and production on the ROLI Seaboard

He apprenticed in Hindustani music with late Pandit Rameshji Kumar for over 25 years, is well-regarded as a tabla soloist in the Pandit Bansilalji Parampara, and is appreciated for his collaborative versatility and sensitive accompaniment across several genres. Deo's informed experiences in ethnomusicology, intercultural performance, and contemporary Hindustani music led him to work as consultant master artist for Nickelodeon Television, record on several music albums, create original music for a variety of performance and video game platforms, guest lecture at universities and symphony orchestras, and provide musical support with artists from musical cultures across the globe.



VISALINI SUNDARAM

is a Carnatic vocalist, trained by Gurus Padma Kutty, Palai Ramachandran, and Palakkad Seshamani Iyer. A trained Bharatanatyam dancer as well, she

has performed internationally as a soloist and a senior member of the Irvine-based Arpana Dance Company, founded, and directed by her Guru Ramya Harishankar. In 2022, Sundaram was awarded the Alliance for California Traditional Arts grant to further hone her musical and dance skills. She is also the Assistant Director of the Arpana School of Dance where she has been teaching for the past seven years.



SATVIK SUBBARAMAN

has been studying the mridangam under the tutelage of Vid. Arjun Narayanan from the age of seven and has been accompanying various artists around Southern California

since the age of nine. He has won multiple awards at the Cleveland Thyagaraja Festival, Saptami Music Competition, and Samaa Arts, and has also qualified and participated in the Indian Fine Arts Academy of San Diego's music festival. Subbaraman is currently

in his first year of studying Mechanical Engineering at UC Santa Barbara.



NIKHITA KAUSHIK has been learning

Carnatic violin from Vid. Raieev Mukundan since 2018. She has given several solo performances as well as accompanied many concerts in

the Southern California community. She has also performed for organizations in India and has won awards in national and international competitions. Kaushik is a freshman at UC Irvine, studying Cognitive Sciences.



NANDINI KANNAN

is a versatile movement artist that creates and performs intentional movements with the goal of inspiring communities to honor and heal

their mind, bodies, and spirits. Born and raised in Los Angeles County, Kannan has predominantly trained in the South Indian hereditary art form of Bharatanatyam for the last 24 years under Ramya Harishankar of Arpana Dance Company. She has actively performed in both traditional performances as well as cross-art collaborations and experimental works. She also trains in other dance styles to expand her artistry and movement vocabulary.



YASHNA NANDAN

began learning Bharatanatyam at the age of seven at Arpana and had her solo debut (arangetram) in 2013. Since then, she has participated in

several ADC productions, including a tour of Germany and Croatia (2013), Sharad (2015), and Celluloid Classics 2 (2017). Yashna is currently pursuing a PhD in economics at the UC, San Diego.



AMRITABALA JANAHAN

grew up in the Arpana dance classes and had her debut (arangetram) at age eight in 2013. Currently studying business, dance has

MID-ALITUMN FESTIVAL

The Mid-Autumn Festival falls on the fifteenth day of the eight month of the lunar calendar. This is also the middle of the second month

of autumn, which is where it gets its name. The moon on this day is usually bright and round, so it also gives the Mid-Autumn Festival the meaning of "reunion" and "completeness." Many celebrate this holiday by gathering with family members, eating round pastries called mooncakes, reciting poems, and worshiping ancestors.



OUR PARTNER'S FALL TRADITIONS



DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS

Día de los Muertos is an ancient traditional Mexican holiday observed on November 1. This holiday celebrates the lives of loved ones

who have passed away by remembering them. Many people put out items as reminders of the deceased, like a favorite photo or favorite foods, often on ofrendas (altars) made especially for this purpose. Today, we welcome Viva La Vida Santa Ana and the special ofrenda they have built in the lobby just for this concert!





DIWALI

Diwali is a joyous festival all about family, great food (especially sweet treats), fun playing with friends and firecrackers, and new

beginnings. Families decorate their homes with lamps or lights called *diya*, and gather together with cousins, neighbors, or parents and grandparents. Some communities consider it the beginning of a new year, with new clothes to match. Although it's primarily a designated Hindu festival, it's celebrated by other faiths as well with the themes of kindness, empathy, and celebration of life.

SPOTLIGHT ON OUR GUEST MUSICIANS AND THEIR INSTRUMENTS

SPOTLIGHT ON THE GUZHENG

"I was really intrigued by the sound of the **GUZHENG** after hearing my mother perform it, and started playing it not long after. I was exposed to traditional Chinese music early in my life because both my parents teach a variety of instruments in that category. The guzheng specifically is very unique because it requires fake nails on four fingers to pluck it, creating a beautiful sound."

The origins of the **guzheng** (or **zheng**) stretch back to over 2,000 years ago in what is now known as China. The oldest writing about it comes from 237 BCE in the Qin era! With such a long history, the guzheng is a popular instrument all around the world, especially in Chinese and Taiwanese communities.

The guzheng is a type of instrument called a **zither**, or a **string instrument** that rests on the floor or a stand and is played **horizontally**. Guzheng musicians often play while sitting on the floor, but sometimes they rest their instruments higher so they can stand or sit in a chair instead.

The **21 strings** of the guzheng are usually made from **nylon or steel**, while the body is made from **wood**. Another important part of the guzheng is the **bridge**, which helps support the strings on the body. Unlike the bridges on violins, violas, or cellos, the bridge on the guzheng is **movable**, so moving the bridge changes **tuning**, or the **set of pitches** the strings play!

SPOTLIGHT ON OUR GUEST MUSICIANS AND THEIR INSTRUMENTS

SPOTLIGHT ON THE GUITAR

"Growing up there was always a **GUITAR** at home. Seeing my father play his guitar for an audience made me want to play. The guitar I'm playing in this show belonged to my beloved father and I borrowed his instrument the first time we did the Día de los Muertos Family Concert a few years ago. He got to see me perform with his guitar and it was also the last show he saw me play in before he passed. I love playing this guitar because it connects me with him."

Guitars can be seen almost everywhere you look—maybe even in your own home. That's partly because this **six-string instrument** is so easy to carry wherever musicians want to play! **Acoustic** guitars are especially lightweight because their **wooden bodies** are **hollow**, which allows the strings to **resonate**, or **sound louder**.

Today's concert features the guitar in our celebration of Día de los Muertos. The guitar was first introduced to what is now Mexico by Spanish **conquistadores**, or colonizers, to play European style dance music. Over time, Mexican musicians adapted the guitar for their own music traditions, like **mariachi**.

Mariachi was first developed in **Jalisco** by the 1850s, mixing local music traditions with European music. Today, Mexican guitarists can be found playing all kinds of music, from mariachi to corridos, classical music to rock, and beyond!

SPOTLIGHT ON THE TABLA

"TABLA expresses rhythm with a unique clarity that draws inspiration from several drumming forms. A tabla set consists of two drums that are played together with different techniques for each hand and each finger. One of the things I most enjoy about playing tabla is the readiness to perform and learn in a myriad of musical styles with the many sounds they make."

The **tabla** featured in today's concert is a pair of drums found in **Hindustani music**, a tradition of classical music from northern India. Each of the drums has its own role to play, so they look and sound different from each other! The **dahina** or **tabla** is the right-hand drum, made of wood, while the **bayan** on the left is usually made from metal. The drums are also different sizes. The smaller dahina is higher-pitched, contrasting the larger bayan with its deep sound.

Tabla musicians sit on the floor, cross-legged, to play their instrument. They can use their hands and fingertips in many ways to get a variety of sounds from the drums, and can change the pitch of the bayan with the heel of their hand while still playing with the fingers of the same hand!

Tabla musicians can perform solo, or as part of a **trio** with **sitar** and **tambura** providing the rhythmic accompaniment.
