ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

Jacob Sustaita
Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony
Music Director for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra

Dr. Jacob Sustaita serves as the Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony and Music Director Carl St.Clair, a position he has held since the fall of 2020. Dr. Sustaita also serves as Music Director and Conductor for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra (PSYO), the premier training orchestra of Orange County, recognized as one of the most outstanding youth orchestras in the country.

Dr. Sustaita is the newly appointed Orchestra Director for the Orange County School of the Arts Symphony Orchestra. In the fall of 2021 and 2022, Sustaita served as Acting Director of Orchestras at the Bob Cole Conservatory of Music at California State University Long Beach (CSULB). From 2015–20, he led the Sam Houston State University Symphony, Chamber, Ballet, and Opera Orchestras as Director of Orchestral Studies. In 2016, Sustaita and the Symphony Orchestra performed the American premiere of Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 1(original Linz version) with high praise from the American and European Bruckner Societies.

Dr. Sustaita is a frequent guest conductor and clinician across the country. In 2015, Sustaita was selected by Carnegie Hall's Weill Institute to serve as Assistant Conductor for Charles Dutoit and the National Youth Orchestra of America (NYO). Sustaita regularly conducted and coached the orchestra during its New York residency and on their seven-city tour of China and Hong Kong.

A native of Texas, Sustaita completed his Doctorate and Bachelor of Music degrees at the University of Houston, where he served as Assistant Conductor for the Moores Opera Center for three seasons. He also earned a Master of Music degree from both Penn State University and Rice University.

His honors include: Schissler Conducting Fellowship, Rice University Prize and Provost Fellowship, and American Prize semi-finalist and finalist. His teachers and mentors include Carl St.Clair, Charles Dutoit, Franz Krager, Brett Mitchell, Gerardo Edelstein, and Paavo Järvi.

She's worked for Henson, Disney, the Academy Awards, and Stanford University among others. She's performed at the Hollywood and Edinburgh Fringe Festivals and The Oscars, Men in Black, Team America, Captain Underpants, and SpongeBob SquarePants. Other highlights include an Emmy nomination, a Jim Henson Foundation Workshop Grant, and restoring the real Rudolph and Santa puppets from the Rankin/Bass classic animated holiday special.

LYDEE WALSH Lydee Walsh is a California native and all-around entertainer. She performs as an actor, dancer, musician,



puppeteer and clown. She has been seen as "Starfleet Crew" on the last season of *Picard*, as a zombie on *Good Trouble* and featured as "Mack's Mom" on *Nicky*, *Ricky*, *Dicky* & *Dawn*. She is also "Felix's Mom" in real life!

Working with puppets has been a wonderfully fun experience for her. She loves to tell stories and put on a show! Walsh has worked with Robin

Walsh on many productions and it has always been magical! This is her second appearance on stage with Pacific Symphony.

ALISSA HUNNICUTT

Alissa Hunnicutt is happy to be back after performing in Pacific Symphony's production of The Magic Flute.



Hunnicutt is a singer, puppeteer, and ukulele artist and holds a Master of Music degree from Manhattan School of Music in opera performance. She trained at The National Puppetry Conference at the Eugene O'Neill Theater Center, studying with an array of master teachers in many different styles of puppetry as well as developing her own short-form puppet theater work.

Hunnicutt was the resident staff puppeteer at Mount Sinai Children's Hospital in NYC, where she hosted live, closed-circuit, television shows. She has performed as a puppeteer on the CBS series Life in Pieces, plays Maggie Raccoon on the series Slugs and Bugs with Randall Goodgame, and in live puppet slams across the country. Hunnicut is currently part of the children's music band, Puppet Snaps, and is studying carving and puppet-making with Bernd Ogrodnik as a student in the Academy of the Wooden Puppet. @puppetmissy

Through her company Little Wonder Productions, Leonard strives to immerse audiences in the tactile, handcrafted world of puppetry as well as creating cinematic experiences that are both visually stunning and emotionally engaging.

KRISTIN CHARNEY

Kristin Charney is a puppeteer, actress, and voice artist for film, television and theater. Her puppetry skills span a wide variety



of styles—from hand and rod to marionettes, to real-time, digital characters. Among Charney's film credits are The Muppets, The Happytime Murders, Forgetting Sarah Marshall, Team America: World Police, Men In Black II and The Hollow Man. Television credits include Fargo, Ratched, Duff's Happy Fun Baketime, Kidding, The Muppets, Sid the Science Kid, Good Morning Today, Imagination Movers, Glee, Frances, Crank Yankers, and lots more. She has made many live theatre appearances in Los Angeles, New York, and beyond.

Kristin's other talents include puppet design and construction as well as teaching. She has created several educational programs that employ puppetry, storytelling, and improv to teach academics and the art of puppetry. THE PUPPETS



SPOTLIGHT ON PIANO

The **piano** is one of the most popular musical instruments in the world. It has the **widest range**, or **distance from the lowest and highest pitches it can play**, of any orchestral instrument, and **composers** frequently use it to **write music** for all the other instruments.

The piano is often played **solo (by itself)**, but is also commonly used to **accompany**, or **play with**, other instruments.



The piano is a very **complex instrument**, with many different moving parts that allow it to work. Pianists press **keys** on the **keyboard**, which in turn moves a **hammer** that hits **steel strings** inside the instrument.



When the strings are hit, they vibrate to make sound, which is amplified, or made louder, by the soundhoard


Pianos come in many different shapes and sizes. From biggest pianos, called **grand pianos**, to the smaller, **upright pianos**, to the miniature **toy pianos**.

THE CARNIVAL OF THE ANIMALS

The Carnival of the Animals is a musical suite, or collection of short musical pieces, written by a French composer named Camille Saint-Saëns. It was written for a much smaller orchestra than you might expect in a concert hall, because it was originally supposed to be performed privately in smaller places, such as people's homes.



Later on, we meet the **tortoises**, and Saint-Saëns plays a **musical joke** on us! He has the orchestra play the famous "Can-Can," very slowly. Why is that funny? Well, in Saint-Saëns' day, everyone knew the "Can-Can" as a **fast and lively** dance. So hearing it played very slowly, to **reflect how slowly tortoises move**, is like hearing the song "Happy" sounding very sad because it was played at a super slow speed.

The other movements of *The Carnival of the Animals* include music representing kangaroos, elephants, an aquarium, an aviary, a swan and much more! **See if you can guess which animal is which, just by listening to the music!**




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
