Join me along with our fantastic OPERA SUPERSTARS and the amazing musicians of Pacific Symphony as we present Rossini's II barbiere di Seviglia (The Barber of Seville).



Rossini was one of the great Italian opera composers. *II barbiere* was first performed over 200 years ago in 1816, and this **comic masterpiece** has been a favorite of musicians and audiences ever since. The toe-tapping music, memorable arias, and constant humor will leave you cheering along and shouting for more.

The Barber of Seville tells the story of two young people and their quest to be together no matter how many disguises or deceptions they encounter along the way. There are plenty of twists and turns and **VOCAL ACROBATICS** known as **bel canto** (or beautiful and virtuosic singing). Each singer uses their voice in different ways to help the story unfold. There are times when the singers' voices are warm and tender and times when they are sparkling and radiant. Since the voice is our spotlight instrument this morning, enjoy the way each singer adds a special touch to the opera.

I look forward to more of our exciting and one-of-a kind programs that we create **just for you**. From all of us at Pacific Symphony –I hope you enjoy **Rossini's II barbiere di Seviglia!**

ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

Jacob Sustaita Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony Music Director for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra Mary E. Moore Family Assistant Conductor Chair

Dr. Jacob Sustaita serves as the Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony and Music Director Carl St. Clair, a position he has held since the fall of 2020. Dr. Sustaita also serves as Music Director and Conductor for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra (PSYO), the premier training orchestra of Orange County, recognized as one of the most outstanding youth orchestras in the country.

Dr. Sustaita is the newly appointed Orchestra Director for the Orange County School of the Arts Symphony Orchestra. In the fall of 2021 and 2022, Sustaita served as Acting Director of Orchestras at the Bob Cole Conservatory of Music at California State University Long Beach (CSULB). From 2015-20, he led the Sam Houston State University Symphony, Chamber, Ballet, and Opera Orchestras as Director of Orchestral Studies. In 2016, Sustaita and the Symphony Orchestra performed the American premiere of Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 1(original Linz version) with high praise from the American and European Bruckner Societies.

Dr. Sustaita is a frequent guest conductor and clinician across the country. In 2015, Sustaita was selected by Carnegie Hall's Weill Institute to serve as Assistant Conductor for Charles Dutoit and the National Youth Orchestra of America (NYO). Sustaita regularly conducted and coached the orchestra during its New York residency and on their seven-city tour of China and Hong Kong.

A native of Texas, Sustaita completed his Doctorate and Bachelor of Music degrees at the University of Houston, where he served as Assistant Conductor

Tenor and conductor Evan Richards studies at Chapman University under Patrick Goeser and Danko Druško. Musical engagements have brought him



to Austria, Canada, China, Czechia, Hong Kong, Italy, Poland, Taiwan, and most of the United States. Notable this season: Tenor Soloist (*Le Roi* David) and assisting Opera Chapman's Music Team. She was most recently seen as Mariola in Jake Heggie's Two Remain with Lyric Opera OC. She was also featured as a soprano soloist on Allegri's Miserere, Richard Einhorn's Voices of Light, and Sarah Kirkland's Mass for the Endangered with the Pacific Chorale. She looks forward to a future of music making and hopes you all enjoy The Barber of Seville!

A native of Toronto, Canada, Dianne B. Manaster began her acting life after many years as an orchestra musician. She recently completed the National Tour of



Tootsie: the Musical, and has appeared regionally in Cabaret and Murder on the Orient Express. Locally, she was seen as the Nurse in Romeo and Juliet, Macbeth, Merry Wives of Windsor, and Anne of Green Gables, among others. Steve Pence has recently appeared as bass soloist with the Jacksonville Symphony in Handel's Messiah and with Charleston Symphony Orchestra in Verdi's



Requiem. He is a frequent soloist with the Los Angeles Master Chorale, and played Hercules in the Los Angeles Philharmonic's production of Phillip Glass' *The Civil Wars*. This year, he will play Vodnik in Pacific Opera Project's production of *Rusalka*.

David Stoneman is known for his work in both classic and modern opera. The California native has sung with opera companies from Santa Barbara to Boston in



repertoire ranging from Henry Purcell to Philip Glass and in roles from Figaro to Scarpia. After studying locally, (OCC, Chapman, and USC) he spent two decades in Boston and New York singing opera and oratorio. His oratorio repertoire includes works as diverse as the requiems of Mozart, Brahms, Verdi, Stravinsky's Mass, and Orff's Carmina Burana. With the Long Beach Chorale & Chamber Orchestra, he has sung the solos in Vaughan Williams'

Dona Nobis Pacem, Haydn's Creation, and Mendelssohn's Elijah.

Mexican Tenor Edgardo Lopez Yanez is currently a firstyear undergraduate student, studying vocal performance at Chapman Univerisity's Hall



Musco-Conservatory of Music. Born in Aguascalientes, Mexico, Lopez Yanez began singing at age seven under the guidance of his father, internationally renowned tenor, Jorge Lopez Yanez, who has taught, mentored, and coached Lopez Yanez ever since. In 2015, he moved to the United States, where he attended and graduated from the South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities. During his time there, he studied with Tom Dickinson and Landon Baumgard. Now, continuing his vocal training at Chapman University, studies with Bruce McClurg.

WHAT IS AN OPERA?

Opera is a **genre** of music. Genres are types of music that are different based on their **musical characteristics**.

One very important musical characteristic of an opera **tells a story through music**. Performers sing *and* act to help tell the story. This means that in an opera, performers are **singers** as well as **actors**!



However, operas also have musicians that are not part of the drama on stage. The performers on stage usually sing while an **orchestra** plays music to accompany the sung music.

One musical style where the orchestra accompanies a singer is called an **aria**. Arias are long **solos**. A **solo** is a piece of music performed by one person.

When a singer is joined by another singer during a song, this is called a **duet** or **duo**, and if there are a lot of singers on stage performing, this is called a **chorus**.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE VOICE



Today, you will hear a powerful and unique musical instrument: the **human voice!** Many people use their voices to **speak**, **sing**, or even provide **vocal percussion** to make music.

There are many different types of voices. Some people have **high voices**, others have **low voices**, and still others have **medium voices**.

In opera, each voice type has its own name according to who sings: male or female. For example, a singer with a **high female voice** is called a **soprano**, while **mezzosopranos** have **lower female voices**. **Tenors** have a **high male voice**, while **baritones** have a **medium-low voice**. Finally, **basses** have the **lowest voice**.

In an opera, you get to hear a variety of voice types all in one show! For example, in this performance you will hear **Figaro's and Dr. Bartolo's baritone voices**, which will sound very different from **Lorenzo's tenor** quality. Furthermore, **Mr. Basilio's bass-baritone** is distinctively lower. Likewise the tone of **Rosie's soprano voice** will contrast that of **Miss Newstead's mezzo-soprano voice**.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE COMPOSER



Gioachino Rossini was a famous Italian composer who was born in 1792. He was a composer who wrote many different types of music genres, including **operas**, **cantatas**, and **symphonies**–just to name a few!

By age 14, Rossini had written his first opera! Rossini continued to write music throughout his entire life and had his musical works performed in places like Italy and France.

Rossini is best-known for his 39 operas, particularly his **comic operas**, such as **The Barber of Seville** (1816), **Cinderella** (1817), and **Semiramide** (1823). His most famous dramatic opera is **William Tell** (1829).

Originally sung in Italian, today we will hear a shorter version of *The Barber of Seville* in English with the story being adapted to take place in a 1950s high school.
